Community Voices

La Libertad Dry Forest Project works with children and adolescents at schools and churches to develop environmental awareness amongst students. The project has expanded its environmental education collaboration with the Christian Church, Casa de Oración [House of Prayer] in Pacasmayo led by Pastor José Guzmán. In December 2021, a location for the new garden was identified in Micaela Bastidas Soup Kitchen, San Demetrio. The soup kitchen gives free food to the neediest families of the community of

San Demetrio, which includes 28 families, 120 people, 20 boys, and 18 girls. Elisabeth Molina Tantalean is one of the mothers who live in San Demetrio and belongs to the soup kitchen of Micaela Bastidas. She describes what it was like before and after the support of La Libertad Dry Forest Project. "Before we had the support, our soup kitchen was not organized and the place was practically abandoned. Now, we have implemented an organic garden, sheds for raising small animals (guinea pigs), a tank for the supply of drinking water, and improvements in the infrastructure of the dining room. There have also been environmental education talks." - Elisabeth Molina Tantalean
